Business summary, January 2015

Neighbourhood planning

After being given a strong mandate from an open village meeting, Parish Councillors worked very hard to put forward a strong case against the Gladman development and it is frustrating that Cheshire East Council's lack of a five-year housing land supply has been the main determinant of this appeal. Combined with the approval of the Heathfield Road application plus other already approved applications there will be 175 new homes coming to the village in the very near future. This will inevitably have a big impact on village life both during the building and afterwards, and will be to the detriment of the medical practice, parking and the creaking sewerage system. The number is also far in excess of the 80-100 houses which we had been led to believe would be required in the Audlem Ward (not just the Parish) as part of the Local Plan.

Last July many residents attended a meeting to discuss the production of a Neighbourhood Plan (which all parties currently seem to support), and in particular a 'fast track' Plan which focused primarily on housing issues. The Parish Council was given a strong mandate to pursue this and work has been going on behind the scenes to produce a draft Vision for Audlem and a Housing Questionnaire. This will give us a strong evidence base to formulate plans and policies that we hope will help to 'protect' the village from speculative development in the future, and determine the design and mix of any further planned developments.

Each household is encouraged to complete the Housing Questionnaire and to attend the various meetings and workshops; this will help us achieve a well-crafted Plan giving a clear indication of what residents really want. We hope to be able to get a draft Neighbourhood Plan together by mid-2015 and go to referendum swiftly thereafter. This document will have statutory weight in planning decisions so please do take this chance to have your say about how Audlem should develop over the next 20 years.

Superfast broadband arrives in Audlem

Good news! Superfast broadband (SFBB) has now come to parts of Audlem and will be rolled out even further in the coming weeks. Connecting Cheshire is to hold a drop-in session in the Public Hall on Tuesday 17 February between 2.00pm and 4.00pm. If you would like to find out more about SFBB, please come along.

Connecting Cheshire urges residents who are thinking of upgrading to shop around for the best deal as the market is very competitive at the moment. You may well be able to get a cheaper price than you are paying at the moment for broadband - and get a faster speed!

ADCA car scheme success

This new scheme launched in May 2014 now provides transport for three to four clients each week to attend appointments at the Surgery, dentists or Leighton Hospital. This proves we were correct to bid for Cheshire East Funds. Our success, however, means we now need additional drivers to help spread the load.

Drivers receive 45p per mile and are allowed to park free at the hospital. We work within the following guidelines:

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- 1) The client telephones the office as soon as they know of an appointment and speaks to one of the volunteers, or leaves a message on the answerphone.
- 2) The office volunteer then contacts possible available drivers who could fulfil the request.
- 3) Once a driver has agreed to transport the client they are given the client's contact details so timings can be arranged.

Volunteers can drive for as little, or as much, as they desire. Even if you can only spare a few hours per month to help transport fellow villagers to Audlem Surgery your assistance would be gratefully accepted.

Dog fouling

For those who are wondering why some of the public footpaths are being fenced off to restrict access to adjacent fields, this is a direct consequence of some irresponsible dog owners failing to clear up after their pets. Farmers are tired of having their silage and crops tainted and tractor blades fouled by dog faeces.

It is not just the fields which are affected. The Parish Council has once again received complaints about dog fouling on pavements, the canal banks and on the playing field. There are dog poo bins in many places throughout the village, so we are asking you to please behave responsibly. 'Scoop the poop', then dispose of the excrement in one of the bins. Please don't leave poo bags hanging on trees or dump them where they were used: this is unsightly and an on-going health hazard.

Precept frozen again

The Parish Council has decided to freeze the precept (local taxation) again this year at £37,529. This is the total amount that Cheshire East collects on behalf of Audlem Parish Council from the residents of the Parish through their council tax. The amount each household actually contributes towards this total sum relates to the council tax band of their dwelling.

Parish Council meetings will be held in the Meeting Rooms adjoining Audlem Methodist Church, Shropshire Street, Audlem, on Mondays 2 February, 2 March and 13 April 2015. At the beginning of each meeting, residents have the opportunity to bring matters of particular concern to the attention of the Parish Council. Everyone is welcome to stay and listen for the rest of the meeting.

This includes people on Zimmer



frames, crutches or with walking sticks, with or without carers accompanying them.

The Wheelyboat Trust has offered the project a 50 percent grant and other sponsors are in the offing. The official appeal will be launched in the middle of February 2015 and we expect to be in operation in time for the Overwater RNLI Festival on May 30 and 31.
